In 2001, I took part in a documentary filmed by the BBC, recreating part of Captain Cook's 1768-71 voyage in a replica of his ship, the *Endeavour*. For six weeks onboard, I played the part of botanical artist Sydney Parkinson.

My current independent project involves illustration of the giant, night-flowering *Victoria* waterlilies.
