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Area- the South Hams, near Salcombe in Devon.

Examples: Camellia Japonica, planted in 1795

2 plants of Fuchsia coccinea

Plants of Solanum Pseudo capsicum, or Amomum Plinii.

Myrtles of every kind, even the double blossomed and orange. The silver myrtle soon became plain on account of the richness of the soil.

Buddleia globosa.

In 1774 a large American aloe, only 28 years old, flowered at Salcombe. There were several plants of Verbena Triphylla growing in open ground at Salcombe. Oranges and lemons, trained as peach trees against walls had been seen in a few gardens of Devon houses for over a hundred years.
